Noble S. Proctor, Ph.D.
April 10, 1942--May 28, 2015

We mark the passing of naturalist Noble Proctor, whose lifelong passion for natural history began when he was a young boy exploring the woodlands and streams of Ansonia with hometown mentor Tom Buswell. Naturalist Roger Tory Peterson, a close friend, once stated, "Noble Proctor is the most knowledgeable naturalist on a local, United States and worldwide scale that I have ever met."

Noble, an SCSU professor of ornithology, botany, and biogeography for 34 years, was a patient and enthusiastic teacher. ANC director Ali Rubelmann and past director Donna Lindgren were both students of his.

For over 40 years, he studied and led wildlife tours in such places as Alaska, Russia, Africa, and Costa Rica, visiting 90 countries. A lifelong ornithologist, he compiled a lifetime birding list of over 6,000 species (814 species in North America) and a list of 512 species of North American bird nests. Noble wrote and co-authored 10 books on birds and wildlife, and was also a wildlife photographer. He worked with Roger Tory Peterson to revise the *Eastern Field Guide to Birds*. Noble also spoke at the UN with Jane Goodall on the state of the environment worldwide.

Biodiversity was of keen interest to Noble. During BioBlitz events, in which the goal is to find as many species as possible in a 24 hour period in a given area. Noble's personal best was 1450 species in one day.

Noble was a member of many wildlife societies, including the American Birding Society and the New Haven Bird Club. He was a founding member of the board of the Roger Tory Peterson Institute for Natural History. His many awards include the Outstanding Conservationist Award from the CT Botanical Society and the American Birding Association's Roger Tory Peterson Award.

Noble's legacy is the life changing infusion of enthusiasm and awareness of the breadth of nature in all who had the good fortune to know him.

Hunting Season Safety

Year round, visitors to the Ansonia Nature and Recreation Center often hear the Ansonia Rod and Gun Club's shooting range activity, which is located on land adjacent to our park. In our 30-year-plus history, we have not had any "incidents" with these good neighbors, though the noise level they produce is sometimes a concern. The staff and wildlife in the park have become accustomed to it over the years. However, fall brings the hunting season, which runs through December 30. Hunting is not allowed in our park, but some of the adjacent land owners, such as State Forest land, do allow it, and this can be a concern to hikers. For your safety, we suggest that you wear brightly colored clothing when walking our trails. We recommend purchasing an orange safety vest at a sporting goods store. Avoid wearing white or woodland colors such as green and brown. Our park is staffed seven days a week. If you have any concerns while walking our trails, please call us at 203-736-1053.
